

Information Pack for 2023 – 2024

THEME – 'Rebuilding'

The 'Rebuilding' Theme can be interpreted as broadly as the Young Photographer wishes and does not need to conform to the dictionary definition of the word.

'Rebuilding Lives and Rebuilding Communities' is one of three unifying themes Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland (Rotary GB&I) is using to link all the service projects Rotary organisations undertake in and with their communities, and the people in them, locally, nationally and internationally.

The Theme for the Young Photographer competition is simply '**Rebuilding**' so it gives young people the widest opportunity to share their creative talents in showing us what it means to them. Introduction

The Rotary Young Photographer Competition is organised and promoted by Rotary GB&I.

There are three stages to the competition, each designed to support and encourage the development of photographic skills. Some stages may have more than one round.

Aims and Objectives

The competition aims to encourage young people to:

- experiment with photography
- use digital and/or traditional methods of photography



- demonstrate interpretation of the topic
- express personal ideas through the medium of photography

Who can take part?

The competition is open to all young people in the age groups shown below. They may be an individual or from any group or community organisation including schools and colleges, home educated, other young peoples' community organisations, for example, community RotaKids, community Interact, Scout Groups, Girl Guides, etc.

The three age groups are:

Junior:	Up to and including 10 years old
Intermediate:	11 to 13 years old
Senior:	14 to 17 years old

Entrants must not be over the upper age parameter for each group on 31st August 2023.

With the age qualifying date of 31st August 2023, it should be noted that some junior entrants may be 11, intermediate entrants may be 14 and some senior entrants may be 18 at the time of some or all the stages of the competitions e.g., a competitor who may be 17 on 31st August but turns 18 on 1st September is allowed to enter.

Harpenden entrants should enter the competition organised by Rotary in Harpenden through their respective group or community organisation or as individuals.

However, entrants may participate in a competition held by a local Rotary organisation outside of their locality but may compete in only one local heat.

The Three Stages of the Competition

Entrants need to complete an entry form, by emailing

youngphotographer@rotaryinharpenden.org.uk , and submit it along with their photograph, to the local organiser, by18th February 2024. It is essential that the name of the competitor and their photographic work is clearly linked with the correct entry form and any necessary consent forms for photographic images used if applicable.

Local Heats

Harpenden's local heat runs between Autumn 2023, up to the submission deadline of 18 February 2024. The winners of each age group are then informed of their success and entered into the Rotary district's competition.

District Finals

These are organised by each Rotary district for the winners of the local heats for each age group. The winners of each age group in the District Finals are then entered into the National Final.

National Final



The National Final is organised by Rotary GB&I and only the winning entry per age group is submitted by each of the districts. Entries are to be sent

digitally by the districts by the deadline of **Tuesday 30th April 2024** to the Rotary Support Centre.

The dates for local heats and district competitions will be determined locally. Entrants should check dates with their local Rotary organisation in the first instance. Any entries submitted after the deadline will not be accepted.

Competition Guidelines

Task

To produce one photograph based upon the theme, '**Rebuilding**'. Mobile Phones or cameras may be used.

To accompany the submission, each entrant MUST provide a brief sentence describing the relationship of the photograph to the theme. Failure to do so will mean the entry is ineligible and the entrant therefore disqualified.

The photograph must be submitted via **Digital Format** and be at least 1500 pixel in size on the longest length. The entries and supporting information sent electronically **MUST NOT EXCEED 15MB per email sent**.

Photographs that are part of a current educational exam portfolio are **not eligible** for the competition, due to educational exam board regulations.

Please Note: Photographs which incorporate images of people under 18 years or vulnerable adults must be accompanied by consent forms for the use of those photographic images.

Plagiarism or Close Copied Images

Plagiarised or 'close-copied' images are not permitted in any competition. It is important that we protect the work of creative individuals. Whilst we are all inspired by the work of others, there is without doubt a grey area where inspiration carries over to close copying. For our competitions 'close copying' is where, to a reasonable person, the submitted entry appears remarkably similar in significant important respects to a body of work created elsewhere. We are looking for original pieces, not copies, which match the theme of the competition.

Judges

The judges will be people with appropriate skills appointed by the organisers at the local and district levels for the Local Heats and District Finals accordingly.

At the National level the judges will be appointed by Rotary GB&I and will not be Rotarians.

The judging criteria is as set out below.

Judging Criteria

Judges will consider:

• technical merit •

- content and composition
- imagination and style.



The judges will not enter any discussion or correspondence regarding their decision; the decision of the judges will be final and not subject to any appeal.

Recognition

At all stages of the competition, competitors will receive a certificate of participation.

Entrants are required to complete an entry form and submit it along with their photographs, to the stage organiser by the 18th of February 2024.

Rotary Youth Competitions and other opportunities for young people

The Young Photographer competition is one of a number of competitions for young people organised by Rotary GB&I. The others are: Young Artist; Young Chef; Youth Speaks: A Debate; Young Environmentalist; Young Filmmaker; Young Musician; and Young Writer. There are also annual Rotary Young Citizen Awards, a number of local Rotary organisations organise Technology Tournaments and there are several Rotary specific programmes including RotaKids, Interact, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, Developing Future Leaders and more.
